### **KS3** Assessment



You may be aware that the Government has removed the old Key Stage 3 levels as a way of assessing students. Schools are now free to decide on their own method of assessment for Years 7 to 9. Whilst that means there are lots of changes and new systems to get used to it has also given schools the opportunity to create something that we feel will support our students in making as much progress as possible.

Our system follows the following key aims:

- break down the curriculum in every subject into meaningful, assessable skills;
- assess students on the individual skills ie what they can do and what they can't do
- Use GCSE grades 1-9 with all year groups

We've recently invested in a subscription to Doddle, an online teaching, homework and assessment resource, to help us in implementing this new system. It allows:

- Teachers to track student progress and provide instant feedback on students' work;
- Students to access Doddle resources online and find support materials to support homework and exam revision;

## Key Stage 3

We have recently introduced Year 7 and 8 students to Doddle via assemblies and Year 9 will be delivered next week. Students will be given a username and password to allow them to log in both at school and at home. Doddle is tablet friendly and can be accessed via a free app that is easy to download. We are committed to ensuring that students build on the progress they have made at Primary School and ensure they have not only first rate teaching in lessons but the resources to become independent.

### Stem Newsletter

On Tuesday 29 November a group consisting of years 7, 8 and 9s attended a STEM workshop lead by The Engineering Development Trust on Carbon Capture. The Workshop brought opportunities for us to both reinforce our learning in the classroom and extend our knowledge. The Engineering Development Trust delivers these workshops to many schools around England as there is a vast decline in engineers, predominantly with the younger generation and females. Therefore by having this workshop they hoped this would make us interested in engineering, which for most of us it did.

We first started with learning the different types of engineers. There are not just a few as most would think, but 6 different engineers all doing different jobs. This part was really interesting as we all got to learn how many engineers there actually are and what they do. We then learnt about energy, looking at both renewable and non-renewable and what types of energy are used around the world. For the most part, we concentrated on wind energy, also known as kinetic energy, which is gained from wind turbines. Within this we learnt why it is beneficial in England as well as other countries and how they work. We did this by engaging in a range of activities from puzzle pieces to discussion, however everyone's favourite was constructing our own wind turbine using a variety of materials. Each group was competing with each other but group 12 won! Congratulations to them.

Overall it was a very enjoyable experience helping us develop our knowledge in a fun way. Thank you to all the teachers who helped organise this experience along with the teachers that helped out on the day.
