

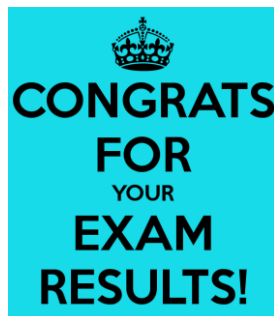


## A New Year Begins

I would like to begin this week's newsletter by welcoming everyone back for the new school year. I hope that you all had a restful and relaxing holiday and are ready for what is sure to be a busy and rewarding year. We have much to celebrate and much to look forward to.

## Exam Results

The celebrating relates especially to this summer's exam results which are very good. I am very pleased to say that the hiccups of last year when grade boundary changes affected some core subjects have not happened again to our students.



The **A Level results** were improved again with a rise in the pass rate to 99%. There was also an increase in the quality of the grades with 44% at B or above. I always feel that the important thing at this level is that students achieved the grades they personally required for what they had planned to do next, and this year a larger number than before did this, with the vast majority of those who had chosen to go to university being accepted at their first choice institution.

**GCSE results** were even more pleasing with most students achieving predicted grades or better. The way that results are reported is changing this year with schools being judged on the amount of progress that students make from primary school. This new measure is called 'Progress 8' and as it is based on comparing the results of every student in the country final calculations are not expected until later this month. At the moment schools can only estimate their figure based on 2015 entries but we are delighted to find that our figure is very high, indicating that students on average achieved half a grade above other students nationally. This new method requires a little more explanation so I will say more in a future newsletter when the 2016 figure is available.

The dates for Peterborough schools this year are different to those of surrounding authorities: this is something that was beyond our control.

Headteachers may grant up to a maximum for five days absence in exceptional circumstances, but these do not include holidays and visiting relatives. ## Eid al-Adha

Next week is the Muslim celebration of Eid al-Adha: we wish our Muslim students and their families well on this important occasion. Students are entitled to one day's authorised absence per year where such an occasion falls in term time. When parents wish to keep their child off school for religious observance the school should be notified in the usual way so that we can authorise the absence. Please note that it is not possible to have a further day's absence for Eid al-Fitr as well. Headteachers were asked to clarify this at the start of the new school year.
