




The futures program is ran by Teach First, and it helps students with university options as well as university applications. These 10 students along with 900 other students from across the UK, were chosen to be part of this program. On this trip the students were given a campus tour of the university, the university was massive and had a wide range of courses available, that can suit a wide range of students. Some students said that is was similar to the University of Cambridge, it had lots of café and the Library was huge. There were also a lot of clubs for all kinds of hobbies, such as the Harry Potter club or the Star Wars club. After being given a campus tour, the students then proceeded to the workshop, where they were introduced to what the program is, and they were also given the chance to meet the other students that were there. They did a few activities which involved getting to know the other students more, by asking about their interests, and they also got to know the leader of their group Fiona Rutherford. Overall the day was amazing, and it really gave them an insight as to what it would be like to go to university, and also how hard they would have to work to get there. #### Myriad Project

At the end of last term we were lucky enough to have a team of researchers from Oxford University visiting school to carry out some research with our Years 7 and 8 students. The Myriad (My Resilience in Adolescence) team are currently embarking on a three year project, involving over 100 schools in the UK. which will evaluate the effectiveness of mindfulness teaching on student well-being. 'Mindfulness' is currently talked about a lot in connection with student resilience and well-being, and there are many educational packages that purport to teach it, however up until now no-one has carried out any sort of research to assess its impact. We are delighted to be taking part in this trial, supporting this important research, and look forward to more visits from the team during the next three years.

#### **Deaf-friendly Theatre Performance**

Fingersmith Productions are bringing a deaf-friendly performance of John Godber's Up and Under to the Key Theatre during half term, 12-14 February.

### **Sensory Garden**

As you are aware, our school works in partnership with Peterborough Local Authority to provide a Secondary Hearing Hub for Peterborough; we offer specialist provision for students with a hearing impairment and a support service to other schools in Peterborough. As part of the development of this work we want to design and build a Sensory Garden in school. This would be for the use of our own students and would also be open to other primary schools and the local community to use.



The intention would be for it to be a learning space and outdoor classroom, as well as a garden. During the next two terms we want to raise money towards building this garden. Our fundraising begins this weekend with Mr Davis climbing Mount Snowdon with the intention of donating any monies raised to the Sensory Garden fund.
